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Product Description:

Genomic DNA was isolated from a preparation of *Francisella tularensis* subsp. *novicida*, strain KM14S.

F. tularensis subsp. *novicida*, is a Gram-negative, facultative bacterium, which grows predominantly in macrophages when living in mammalian hosts. ¹ It is commonly used for studying *F. tularensis* pathogenesis since it is highly virulent in mice but has minor effects on humans. ²

F. tularensis subsp. *novicida*, strain KM14S is a derivative of KM14 strain. The KM14S strain is unable to grow in macrophages and no longer expresses kanamycin resistance.³ KM14 is a derivative of the wild-type strain U112.

NR-3028 has been confirmed as non-type B by PCR amplification of an approximately 390 bp amplicon. Analysis of the 16S sequence indicates that NR-3028 is consistent with other strains of *F. tularensis* subsp. *novicida*. NR-3028 has been qualified for PCR applications by amplification of approximately 1500 bp of the 16S ribosomal RNA gene.

Material Provided:

Each vial contains approximately 4–6 µg of bacterial genomic DNA in TE buffer (10 mM Tris-HCl and 1 mM EDTA, pH 8.0). The vial should be centrifuged prior to opening.

Packaging/Storage:

NR-3028 was packaged aseptically in screw-capped plastic cryovials. The product is provided frozen on dry ice and should be stored at -20°C or colder immediately upon arrival. Freeze-thaw cycles should be minimized.
