## Material Provided:

Each vial contains approximately 1 mL of cell lysate and supernatant from Madin-Darby Canine Kidney (MDCK) cells (ATCC® CCL-34) infected with influenza A virus, A/Wisconsin/629-D02312/2009 (H1N1)pdm09.

Note: If homogeneity is required for your intended use, please purify prior to initiating work.

## Packaging/Storage:

NR-19809 was packaged aseptically in screw-capped plastic cryovials. The product is provided frozen and should be stored at -70°C or colder immediately upon arrival. For long-term storage, the vapor phase of a liquid nitrogen freezer is recommended. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.

## Growth Conditions:

Host: MDCK cells (ATCC® CCL-34)

Growth Medium: Dulbecco's Modified Eagle Medium supplemented with 0.1% bovine serum albumin and 0.2 µg/mL L-1-tosylamido-2-phenylethyl chloromethyl ketone (TPCK)-treated trypsin

Infection: Cells should be 100% confluent

Incubation: 2 to 4 days at 35°C and 5% CO<sub>2</sub>

Cytopathic Effect: Refractile cell rounding and sloughing
