Product Description:

NR-12136 is a formalin-inactivated surface antigen vaccine prepared from an egg-grown high-growth influenza virus reassortant containing the hemagglutinin (HA) and neuraminidase antigens from the Y280-like A/chicken/Hong Kong/G9/1997 strain and the internal genes from A/Puerto Rico/8/1934.^{1,2}

Please note that this vaccine preparation is being released for research use only and not for human use.

Material Provided:

Each syringe contains 7.5 µg (0.5 mL suspension) of the hemagglutinin (HA) antigen from influenza virus A/chicken/Hong Kong/G9/1997 (H9N2).

Packaging/Storage:

NR-12136 is packaged in a pre-filled syringe. The product is provided on refrigerated bricks and should be stored at 2°C to 8°C immediately upon arrival. Do not freeze. Protect from light. Shake before use.
