Buck, Director, Center for the Study of Biological Complexity, Department of Microbiology and Immunology, Virginia Commonwealth University Medical Center, Richmond, Virginia. The deposited material was inoculated into Lactobacilli MRS Broth and incubated for 48 hours at 37°C in an aerobic atmosphere with 5% CO₂. The material from the initial growth was passaged once in Lactobacilli MRS Broth for 48 hours at 37°C in an aerobic atmosphere with 5% CO₂ to produce this lot.

³48 hours at 37°C in an aerobic atmosphere with 5% CO2 on Lactobacilli MRS Agar

³24 hours at 37°C in an aerobic atmosphere with 5% CO₂ on Lactobacilli MRS Broth. No growth was visible on Lactobacilli MRS Agar after 24 hours at 37°C.
