Antibody Class: IgG1k

Mouse monoclonal antibody prepared against the Crimean-Congo hemorrhagic fever virus (CCHFV) Pre-Gn glycoprotein was purified from clone 7F5 hybridoma supernatant by protein G affinity chromatography. The B cell hybridoma was generated by the fusion of Sp2/0-Ag14 mouse myeloma cells with splenocytes from BALB/c mice immunized with protein A sepharose-bound CCHFV glycoprotein-antibody complexes as described by Bertolotti-Ciarlet et al.¹

This reagent is part of the Joel M. Dalrymple – Clarence J. Peters USAMRIID Antibody Collection.

Material Provided:

Each vial of NR-40281 contains approximately 100 µL of purified monoclonal antibody in PBS. The concentration, expressed as mg per mL, is shown on the Certificate of Analysis.

Packaging/Storage:

NR-40281 was packaged aseptically in screw-capped plastic vials and is provided frozen on dry ice. The product should be stored at -20°C or colder immediately upon arrival. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.

Functional Activity:

NR-40281 is reactive in indirect immunofluorescence assays using Vero E6 cells infected with CCHFV. The antibody is not neutralizing *in vitro*. See Certificate of Analysis for details. Clone 7F5 antibody is also reported to function in ELISA, immunoprecipitation, and radioimmunoassay applications, and to recognize an epitope that is conserved among some, but not all, CCHFV strains tested.¹⁻³
