<u>Original Source</u>: Bacillus anthracis (B. anthracis), strain Sterne 7702, derivative BJH035, was deposited as a deletion mutant of a lethal factor precursor gene where *lef* was replaced with a kanamycin resistance (Km^r) cassette.^{1,2}

<u>Comments</u>: *B. anthracis*, strain Sterne 7702, derivative BJH035 is reported to contain the pXO1 plasmid and lack the pXO2 plasmid.^{1,2} The complete genome of *B. anthracis*, strain Sterne has been sequenced (GenBank: <u>AE017225</u>).³

B. anthracis is an aerobic, Gram-positive, spore-forming, rod-shaped bacillus that causes the acute infectious disease anthrax. Herbivores are the natural hosts and become infected by consuming soil. Humans are incidentally infected by coming into contact with infected animals or their products. *B. anthracis* virulence is dependent on the possession of two large plasmids, pXO1 and pXO2, which are responsible for the expression of an extracellular toxin and a polysaccharide capsule, respectively. The extracellular toxin is composed of three proteins: lethal factor, edema factor, and protective antigen.⁴

The presence of pXO1 and the absence of pXO2 in NR-13674 have been confirmed by PCR amplification of plasmid-specific sequences from extracted DNA.

Material Provided:

Each vial contains approximately 0.5 mL of bacterial culture in Tryptic Soy broth supplemented with 10% glycerol.

<u>Note</u>: If homogeneity is required for your intended use, please purify prior to initiating work.

Packaging/Storage:

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NR-13674 was packaged aseptically, in screw-capped plastic cryovials. The product is provided frozen and should be stored at -60°C or colder immediately upon arrival. For long-term storage, the vapor phase of a liquid nitrogen freezer is recommended. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.

Temperature: 28°C to 37°C Atmosphere: Aerobic

Propagation:

- 1. Keep vial frozen until ready for use, then thaw.
- Transfer the entire thawed aliquot into a single tube of broth
- Use several drops of the suspension to inoculate an agar slant and/or plate.
- 4. Incubate the tube, slant and/or plate for 24 to 48 hours.
