Original Source: Enterococcus faecalis (E. faecalis), strain V587 was recovered in a urine specimen collected on February 26, 1987, at Barnes Hospital, St. Louis, Missouri, USA.^{1,2}

<u>Comments</u>: *E. faecalis*, strain V587 has shown resistance to vancomycin.^{1,2} The complete genome of *E. faecalis*, strain V587 has been sequenced (GenBank: <u>AJBB000000000</u>).

E. faecalis is a Gram-positive, facultatively anaerobic coccus that is a commensal inhabitant of the gastrointestinal and female genital tract.³ It is also the most frequently isolated species, often as a monoinfection, from root canals of endodontically treated teeth with persistent apical periodontitis.⁴ *E. faecalis* is an opportunistic pathogen and has become a serious concern in hospitals because of its inherent hardiness and high levels of antibiotic resistance.⁵ Virulent strains often express a cytolysin toxin that is encoded on various mobile genetic elements, pathogenicity islands, and conjugative plasmids.⁶

Material Provided:

Each vial contains approximately 0.5 mL of bacterial culture in Tryptic Soy broth supplemented with 10% glycerol. Each vial of NR-31979 lot 70009682 contains approximately 0.5 mL of bacterial culture in Brain Heart Infusion broth supplemented with 10% glycerol.

<u>Note</u>: If homogeneity is required for your intended use, please purify prior to initiating work.

Packaging/Storage:

NR-31979 was packaged aseptically, in screw-capped plastic cryovials. The product is provided frozen and should be stored at -60°C or colder immediately upon arrival. For long-term storage, the vapor phase of a liquid nitrogen freezer is recommended. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.

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Media:

Tryptic Soy broth or Brain Heart Infusion broth or equivalent

Tryptic Soy agar or Tryptic Soy agar with 5% defibrinated sheep blood or Brain Heart Infusion agar or equivalent Incubation:

Temperature: 37°C

Atmosphere: Aerobic (with or without 5% CO₂) or anaerobic Propagation:

- 1. Keep vial frozen until ready for use, then thaw.
- Transfer the entire thawed aliquot into a single tube of broth.
- 3. Use several drops of the suspension to inoculate an agar slant and/or plate.
- 4. Incubate tube, slant and/or plate for 1 day.
