## **Product Description:**

<u>Bacteria Classification</u>: unclassified Clostridiales, Clostridiales, Oral Taxon 876

Original Source: Clostridiales sp., Oral Taxon 876, strain F0540 was isolated on September 19, 2007, from the tooth of a medically healthy, caries-free patient in Massachusetts, USA.<sup>1</sup>

<u>Comments</u>: Clostridiales sp., Oral Taxon 876, strain F0540 (HMP ID 1982) is a reference genome for <u>The Human Microbiome Project</u> (HMP). HMP is an initiative to identify and characterize human microbial flora. The complete genome of Clostridiales sp., Oral Taxon 876, strain F0540 was sequenced at the Genome Institute at <u>Washington University</u> (GenBank: <u>AWSZ000000000</u>).

Note: HMP material is taxonomically classified by the depositor. Quality control of these materials is only performed to demonstrate that the material distributed by BEI Resources is identical to the deposited material.

Clostridiales bacteria are generally Gram-positive, rod-shaped, obligate anaerobes that are ubiquitous in virtually all anoxic habitats where organic compounds are found, especially soils, aquatic sediments and the intestinal tracts of animals and humans.<sup>2,3</sup> Bacteria of the order Clostridiales have a Gram-positive cell wall but may stain Gram-variable or Gram-negative.<sup>2</sup> Most species have the ability to form spores<sup>3,4</sup> and a few are pathogenic, producing very potent biological toxins known to affect humans.<sup>5</sup>

## **Material Provided:**

Each vial contains approximately 0.5 mL of bacterial culture in Brain Heart Infusion broth supplemented with 10% glycerol.

<u>Note</u>: If homogeneity is required for your intended use, please purify prior to initiating work.

## Packaging/Storage:

HM-1139 was packaged aseptically in cryovials. The product is provided frozen and should be stored at -60°C or colder immediately upon arrival. For long-term storage, the vapor

phase of a liquid nitrogen freezer is recommended. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.

#### **Growth Conditions:**

Media:

Modified Reinforced Clostridial broth or Brain Heart Infusion broth or equivalent

Tryptic Soy agar with 5% sheep blood or Brain Heart Infusion agar or equivalent

Incubation:

Temperature: 37°C Atmosphere: Anaerobic

Propagation:

- 1. Keep vial frozen until ready for use, then thaw.
- Transfer the entire thawed aliquot into a single tube of broth.
- 3. Use several drops of the suspension to inoculate an agar slant and/or plate.
- Incubate the tube, slant and/or plate at 37°C for 2 to 3 days
