The Lethal Dose 50% (TCID₅₀) endpoint is the 50% lethal endpoint in tissue culture. The LD₅₀ is the dilution of virus that under the conditions of the assay can be expected to kill half of the animals exposed. A reciprocal of the dilution required to yield the LD₅₀ provides a measure of the potency of a virus preparation.
