Original Source: Klebsiella pneumoniae (K. pneumoniae), strain MRSN 4759 was isolated in 2011 from a human urine sample in North America as part of a global surveillance

program.1

Comments: K. pneumoniae, strain MRSN 4759 was deposited as part of the MRSN Klebsiella pneumoniae Diversity Panel available from BEI Resources as NR-55604. NR-55506 was deposited as multi-locus sequence type (MLST) ST 37, K-locus type (KL) 38, O-locus type (OL) O3b and VIR score 0. MRSN 4759 was deposited as a multidrug-resistant strain, sensitive to amikacin, cefepime, ceftazidime/avibactam, ceftolozane/tazobactam. ciprofloxacin. ertapenem. gentamicin, imipenem. piperacillin/tazobactam, levofloxacin, meropenem, tetracycline, tigecycline, tobramycin trimethoprim/sulfamethoxazole and resistant to ampicillin/sulbactam, aztreonam, ceftazidime and ceftriaxone. Strain MRSN 4759 is reported to have three beta-lactamase genes (blactx-M-3, blashv-11 and blatem-1; conferring resistance to beta-lactams), one fosfomycin resistance gene (fosA\_gen; conferring resistance to fosfomycin), one macrolide-lincosamide-streptogramin B resistance gene (ermC; conferring resistance to macrolides, lincosamides and streptogramins B antibiotics), one quinolone resistance gene (qnrS1; conferring resistance to quinolones) and one dihydrofolate reductase gene (dfrA14; conferring resistance to trimethoprim).1 The complete genome of K. pneumoniae, strain MRSN 4759 has been sequenced (GenBank: JAGYFA000000000).

K. pneumoniae is a Gram-negative enterobacterium that is a major cause of nosocomial infections of the urinary and respiratory tracts. Due to the extensive spread of antibiotic-resistant strains, especially of extended-spectrum β-lactamase (ESBL)-producing strains, there has been renewed interest in Klebsiella infections. 2,3,4

### **Material Provided:**

Each vial contains approximately 0.5 mL of bacterial culture in Tryptic Soy broth supplemented with 10% glycerol.

Note: If homogeneity is required for your intended use, please purify prior to initiating work.

### Packaging/Storage:

NR-55506 was packaged aseptically in cryovials. The product is provided frozen and should be stored at -60°C or colder immediately upon arrival. For long-term storage, the vapor phase of a liquid nitrogen freezer is recommended. Freeze-thaw cycles should be avoided.

### **Growth Conditions:**

Media:

Nutrient broth or Tryptic Sov broth or equivalent

Nutrient agar or Tryptic Soy agar or Tryptic Soy agar with 5% defibrinated sheep blood or equivalent

Incubation:

Temperature: 37°C Atmosphere: Aerobic

Propagation:

- 1. Keep vial frozen until ready for use, then thaw.
- 2. Transfer the entire thawed aliquot into a single tube of broth.
- 3. Use several drops of the suspension to inoculate an agar slant and/or plate.
- 4. Incubate the tube, slant and/or plate at 37°C for 1 day.
