#### **Product Description:**

Genomic RNA was isolated from a preparation of cell lysate and supernatant from Madin-Darby canine kidney SIAT-1 (MDCK-SIAT1) cells infected with influenza B virus, B/Baltimore/JH003/2021. Influenza B virus, B/Baltimore/JH003/2021 was isolated from a human in 2021 in Baltimore, Maryland, USA.1

NR-59589 has been qualified for PCR applications by amplification of an approximately 1000 base pairs of the hemagglutinin gene. Recommended dilutions for successful RT-PCR amplification are indicated on the Certificate of Analysis for each lot.

#### **Material Provided:**

Each vial contains approximately 100 µL of viral genomic RNA in TE buffer (10 mM Tris-HCl, 1 mM EDTA, pH 8.0). The viral genomic RNA is in a background of cellular nucleic acid and carrier RNA. The vial should be centrifuged prior to opening.

#### Packaging/Storage:

NR-59589 was packaged aseptically in screw-capped plastic cryovials. The product is provided frozen on dry ice and should be stored at -60°C or colder immediately upon arrival. Freeze-thaw cycles should be minimized.
